## BOOSTING B.C.'S MARINE SECTOR BY SUPPORTING TECH COMPANIES

As another step forward in the Look West strategy, innovative B.C. companies can now test and showcase new ways they can support more good jobs in a more productive, efficient and growing marine sector.

"B.C.'s marine sector has deep roots in our province, and by partnering with our cutting-edge tech companies, we can help strengthen Canada's defence capabilities while creating more good, family-supporting jobs for British Columbians," said Ravi Kahlon, Minister of Jobs and Economic Growth. "By focusing on innovation and local collaboration, we're ensuring that work to support national defence also drives real benefits for people and businesses here at home. This is our Look West plan in action."

### New testbed for marine technology, innovation

Through the Integrated Marketplace program, delivered by Innovate BC, the Province is launching a marine and coastal testbed to



find new ways to solve industry challenges with made-in-B.C. technology. These challenges include decarbonization, improved efficiency and competitiveness, and better health and safety. Solutions to these challenges will be designed to support innovation that improves environmental monitoring, vessel optimization, coastal resilience and Canadi-

an sovereignty, while helping companies bring new technology to market faster.

### The new testbed will focus on technologies related to:

power supply, offshore and renewable energy naval defence marine robotics, mobile assets, electrification marine vessel optimization ocean-observing sys-

tems, connectivity coastal-resilience tools, solutions supply-chain and goods movement The testbed will provide the real-world environment for tech companies to test, deploy and scale their innovations in the sector, as well as the reference case they need to sell their products and services to industrial buyers worldwide. Some technologies de-

ployed under this testbed may be considered dual-use technologies, meaning they could be used for both commercial and defence purposes. That will be key to B.C. securing its fair share of federal defence funding and is another way the Province is working to meet its Look West goal of securing 35% of federal defence vessel contracts over 10 years. "British Columbia is a leader in marine technology innovation, and home to the largest maritime sector in Canada, putting us in a strong position to help local companies succeed and scale in this space," said Peter Cowan, president and CEO, Innovate BC. "Through this new testbed, we're creating real-world opportunities for made-in-B.C. solutions to be tested, adopted and deployed with key industry partners. It's a powerful way to help innovators across the province grow, while strengthening a sector that is vital to our economy and advancing the Province's Look West strategy."

The first three projects supported through the new testbed demonstrate how B.C. innovators are applying new technologies to real-world marine challenges.

### Cleaner, more efficient vessels

KOTUG Canada, a Metchosisin-based company providing oil-tanker escort and oil-spill response services using vessels berthed in Beecher Bay, and SC'INNEW First Nation will be working with Offshore Designs to deploy its underwater robotic vessel-cleaning technology. The partnership is made possible through a \$290,000 investment through the Integrated Marketplace.

The goal of the project is to provide KOTUG with a cost-effective service that can improve fuel efficiency while reducing underwater noise, which can be harmful to marine life. KOTUG will also be working with Rokir Analysis to deploy instrumentation that will be used to collect relevant project data.

# Moving forward with Indigenous-led treatment and recovery, substance-use services in Terrace

People in Terrace and across northwestern B.C. will soon have better access to culturally safe, community-based withdrawal-management services, as Northern Health has purchased a site to house new withdrawal-management beds in Terrace.

“We’ve heard clearly from people in the northwest that having access to treatment and recovery services close to home — including withdrawal management — is a top priority,” said Josie Osborne, Minister of Health. “By partnering with Indigenous leaders, Northern Health and community organizations, we’re building a system of care that reflects the region’s needs and values. These new services will help people access support in ways that are culturally safe, respectful and rooted in community.”



About the site  
The building at 4837 Keith Ave. in Terrace has 1,288 square metres of space.

The site will require renovations before it can operate as a withdrawal-management facility. Renovation timelines are not yet known and will be determined after Northern Health completes a full assessment and planning process.

Partnering with NFNA on new Indigenous-led services

In addition to the new withdrawal-management site, more treatment and recovery services are coming to the region through the Province’s Indigenous Treatment and Recovery Program. The NFNA, in partnership with the Province, Northern Health and the First Na-

tions Health Authority, is implementing several new services that strengthen the continuum of care:

12 land-based treatment beds at Red Road North to serve community members

10 supportive-recovery beds at the Braun building in Terrace, slated to open later this spring

These services complement the planned withdrawal-management facility in Terrace and support a comprehensive, culturally rooted substance-use care model in the northwest.

“Northern First Nations Alliance has consistently called for meaningful change in how substance-use services are delivered in the northwest,” said Brenna Johnson-Innes, chair of the NFNA board and Deputy Chief of Gitxaala Nation. “With Red Road North, the recovery beds at the

Braun building and now a new withdrawal-management site in Terrace, we are seeing that vision take shape. These are tangible steps grounded in our Nations, our cultures and our responsibility to care for our people. This work is about strengthening families today and creating healthier pathways for future generations.”

Road to Recovery in the northwest

The Province is working in partnership with the NFNA, First Nations Health Authority (FNHA), and Northern Health to build a culturally grounded substance-use system of care in the northwest. This includes both work through B.C.’s Road to Recovery model of care and supporting new Indigenous-led services.

Working together, the partners are adding new services across the con-

tinuum of care, including:

NFNA-led outreach services

Indigenous-led treatment and recovery beds outpatient withdrawal-management teams enhanced transportation supports

the new withdrawal-management facility, led by Northern Health. Building a substance-use system of care

This is part of government’s work to expand access and build a full and seamless continuum of mental-health and substance-use care so people can get the help they need, when and where they need it.

This includes 3,785 treatment and recovery beds, of which 829 are new since 2017, launching the Opioid Treatment Access Line, opening Foundry youth centres and First Nations healing facilities.

# New support for Squamish manufacturing project strengthens local jobs

A Squamish-based industrial helium and hydrogen systems manufacturer is being supported by the Province to grow its production capacity, produce a wider range of products and create more good jobs for people in the community. Through the BC Manufacturing Jobs Fund and the Look West strategy, the Province is providing as much as \$400,000 to Quantum Technology Corp. This funding will help Quantum Technology double the size of its manufacturing space and purchase the specialized equipment it needs to meet the growing demand in the sector. The project will enhance internal manufacturing capabilities, bringing production of crucial components in-house and being more self-sufficient, rather than buying goods and services from suppliers, while creating 10 new jobs.



“B.C.’s manufacturing sector is a cornerstone of our economy, creating good jobs and building stronger, more resilient supply chains,” said Ravi Kahlon, Minister of Jobs and Economic Growth. “That’s why we’re making strategic investments to help innovative companies like Quantum Technology grow, compete and succeed. This is what our Look West strategy is about - supporting high-value B.C. manufacturing that creates new op-

portunities for workers, while driving economic growth in communities across the province.”

Expanding capacity, creating new jobs Quantum Technology Corp. is a developer of advanced gas recovery, purification and liquefaction systems specializing in helium and hydrogen technologies for industrial applications.

“With support from the BC Manufacturing Jobs Fund, we’re expanding our Ca-

nadian facility to enhance production of our advanced recovery, purification and liquefaction systems for specialty gases, especially helium and hydrogen,” said Elena Baglietto, chief operating officer, Quantum Technology Corp. “This investment strengthens B.C.’s clean tech sector, supports highly skilled jobs and boosts our capacity to deliver specialized technologies to global markets - designed and built right here in British

Columbia.”

BC Manufacturing Jobs Fund driving major investment The BC Manufacturing Jobs Fund supports high-value industrial projects in all regions of the province, helping companies modernize, grow and create stable supply chains and family-supporting jobs.

During the construction phase of these projects and in their first few years of expanded operations, the BC Manufacturing Jobs Fund is expected to generate \$17 billion in new economic activity, nearly \$7 billion to B.C.’s gross domestic product and \$714 million in provincial revenue.

“B.C. companies are stepping up with innovation and expertise that’s in demand around the world,” said Paul Choi, parliamentary secretary for trade. “Investments through the BC Manufacturing

Jobs Fund help businesses like Quantum Technology Corp. scale up, strengthen our export capacity and position B.C. as a leader in advanced manufacturing. This support is about opening new doors for trade, creating jobs and ensuring our province remains competitive in a rapidly changing global economy.”

This work is part of the Province’s Look West strategy for jobs and industry, which outlines B.C.’s vision to deliver jobs and opportunities for people by strengthening the workforce to develop a more independent and resilient economy.

# Expanding culturally grounded support for Indigenous people with diverse needs in Port Alberni

Indigenous people with developmental disabilities in Port Alberni and those with fetal alcohol spectrum disorder and autism who need significant help with day-to-day tasks will benefit from stronger pathways to cultural, housing and community supports through a new pilot project.

The Port Alberni Friendship Centre will deliver the project with funding from Community Living BC (CLBC).

“Indigenous people with diverse abilities deserve supports that honour their cultures, their strengths and their connections to community,” said Sheila Malcolmson, Minister of Social Development and Poverty Reduction. “So, we’re investing in approaches led by Indigenous organizations for people to be supported in ways that are close to their community, trusted and grounded in who they are. This pilot can help remove barriers and make it easier for people to access the services and cultural supports that matter most in their lives.”

Helping eligible individuals access supports

We’re excited about this pilot project because it allows us to meet people where they are and link them with services that truly reflect their values and priorities, bringing us closer to reconciliation.”

pilot program funds new Community Connections workers in each participating friendship centre to provide culturally informed, hands-on support for Indigenous adults who may be eligible for CLBC services. Many individuals face complex needs, unstable housing or limited support networks, and the workers respond in ways guided by local teachings, priorities and relationships.

These workers help

people: navigate housing, health and social services connect with Elders, culture and community build relationships with CLBC and service partners strengthen safety, belonging and stability

“The program is part of CLBC’s commitment to reconciliation and cultural safety,” said Joanne Mills, vice-president of quality services and Indigenous re-

lations, CLBC, and a member of Fisher River Cree Nation with ties to Skidegate. “It offers friendship centres the flexibility to create culturally grounded, innovative approaches that build trust and improve access to services. Our hope is that this will encourage friendship centres to pursue pre-qualification as vendors, strengthening opportunities for future service delivery partnerships.”

## *2026 Toyota Tundra CrewMax SR: All Round Great!*

The 2026 Toyota Tundra is one of the biggest full-size pickups in the market place. Square shouldered, brawny, and made for extra heavy-duty work or play- its very capable. For 2026, the Tundra continues with either a gasoline V6 engine or a V6 hybrid unit. There is a host of models, body styles, pickup bed sizes, and option packages to go from well- equipped work truck, to high-roller luxury cruiser. You also have specialized Off- Road TRD, TRD PRO models and Special Editions. The Tundra is designed with advanced off-road features such as Multi-Terrain Select, Crawl Control, and an available locking rear differential. Combined with part-time 4WD, Downhill Assist Control, and Off-Road shock absorbers, the Tundra tackles rough terrain or heavy-duty hauling with ease. The gasoline-only entry level Tundra SR uses a twin-turbocharged 3.4L V6 engine, known as the "i-Force" with 358 horsepower and 406 lb-ft of torque. The SR CrewMax version (As tested).offers back-seat passengers' more legroom and comfort. Depending on the configuration, the Tundra can tow up to 5,080 kg (11,199 lbs), making it one of the most capable pickups in its segment. The 2026 Toyota Tundra model comes in 10 trim levels ranging from \$54,440 to \$83,150. The Tundra hybrid adds a hybrid system comprised of an electric mo-



tor/generator and the ten-speed automatic transmission. The 2026 Toyota Tundra Hybrid ranges in price from \$76,075 to \$94,380. Our CrewMax tester (Base price -\$59,685.) came with the optional SR5 TRD Off Road package (\$5,431) with TRD Leather Wrapped Shift Knob, Intuitive Parking Assist with Auto, Braking, TRD Off Road Shock Absorbers, and TRD Heated Steering Wheel. Blind Spot Monitoring with RCTA, LED Daytime

Running Lights, and LED Fog Lamps is also added. This packages also adds a unique TRD Front Grille, 18 - inch Off Road Alloy Wheels and tire package along with a heavy-duty Tow Package, Locking Rear Differential, and Multi-Terrain Select mode. The 2026 Tundra sees push-button start along with Android Auto and Apple CarPlay compatibility. The front dash is well designed with large clear instrumentation and goods sized controls.

The seats all rounds are comfortable with plenty of room and are heated. Overall, the tundra has a simple, sturdy, well-built spacious, luxury laden interior.
